William RUNDLE 1819 – 1872

Things can happen fast in Cornwall. William RUNDLE was living with his parents in St Blazey, near St Austell, Cornwall, up to the 1851 census when he was 31 years old. Within three years, he had married Caroline GEORGE in Luxulyan, Cornwall, had a child, and was on a ship to Adelaide in 1854. As a 35 year old, he would have been a very experienced miner, and is described in the census and elsewhere as both a tin and a copper miner. He was no doubt enticed to come to Adelaide with his new wife and child to work in the mining industry. Tin and copper mining was declining in Cornwall in the mid 1800's, and he would have expected a better life as a miner in the new world.

They settled in Burra, some 200 km north of Adelaide, where a further five children were born. Sadly, three died at an early age, and are buried in the old Burra cemetery. I have visited the site, but few headstones and markers remain. Around 1865, once it was clear the Burra mines were struggling, or perhaps because William was retrenched, the family moved to Moonta, where William would have worked till he died. He died in 1871, aged just 51 years.

St Blazey was in a mining region, primarily mining tin and copper, but in the mid 1800's it was also becoming known for China clay mining. The nearby Eden Project, in a clay quarry, and which I have visited, is a major tourist attraction and tropical plant arboretum.

Source of the RUNDLE surname (from the Familysearch website):

English nickname from Middle English roundel (Old French rondel), a diminutive of round(e) 'rotund, plump'. Compare Round. Perhaps from the personal name Rondulf, a West Midlands variant of Randulf. See Randolph and Randall. Habitational name from Randall Wood in Shorne (Kent), from Old French rondel 'circle, something circular'. Altered form of German Rundel.

Ambrose RUNDLE b c1690

The earliest RUNDLE I have found is Ambrose, and he is recorded on his son's baptism certificate, as indexed on the Findmypast website. He is recorded as living in St Blazey, near St Austell (marked as 1 on the map). This was a significant China Clay mining area, although it would be many years after Ambrose's death before clay mining began. Now, the Eden Project, nearby, uses one of the clay quarry areas.

In Ambrose's time, however, copper and tin mining were the predominant local industry, and he would have been involved in some way.

Ambrose RUNDLE b1715

Ambrose's son, also Ambrose, was born in 1715, in St Blazey, Cornwall. He married locally, but I cannot find a record of this. I do know he had a son, also Ambrose born in St Blazey in 1739. This Ambrose probably also worked in the mining industry.

Ambrose RUNDLE b1739

This Ambrose RUNDLE was born in 1739, still in St Blazey, and he married Margaret Horskin in March 1777, at St Blazey. This is near St Austell, in the eastern part of Cornwall. Several generations (at least) lived in this village. Ambrose and Margaret nee HORSKIN had a child Joseph RUNDLE, born in 1791. I am a little concerned here that the parents may be too old, but I cannot find a birth record of Margaret to see how old she was at this birth. But, there are no other records for her. It was about this time that China clay was discovered in the area, and when the locals learnt how to mine and use it.



Joseph RUNDLE b1791

Joseph RUNDLE was born in 1791, and he married Elizabeth ROBINS in January 1814, in St Blazey. They produced one son William, born in 1819, and six daughters. In the 1841 census, Joseph is described as a mine labourer, and is at least a fifth generation resident of St Blazey.

As far as I have been able to determine, only William RUNDLE left Cornwall for Australia, and everyone else seemed to stay in their home county. The parish is known for tin and copper mining, but in more recent times, they also mined China clay in the area. Today, 'The Eden Project', in an old clay quarry, dominates the area.

William RUNDLE b1819

This William RUNDLE is the subject of this narrative. He is recorded as living with his parents and youngest sister in the family residence in the 1841 and 1851 census. In the 1851 census, he is described as a tin miner. He married Caroline GEORGE in 1851, after the census was taken. Their first child, William, was born in 1852. This family then embarked for Australia in 1854.

The family of William, Caroline nee GEORGE and young William arrived at Port Adelaide on 24 October 1854, on the barque 'Isle of Thanet'. They probably came here as assisted immigrants and went straight to Burra for William to work in the mines there. They stayed in Kooringa (part of Burra) till at least June 1865, when the youngest daughter Emily died. Altogether, three of their children died before the age of three, so it may not have been a great time for them in Burra. Also, the mine in Burra was struggling to find ore in the 1860's, so William must have started to look for work elsewhere. The cemetery where their children are buried is very old, and very few headstones remain. I took a photo in April 2018 (below).

The old cemetery at the end of Chapel Street, Burra Kooringa, where William and Caroline have three children buried. Not much is left.



Not sure when William RUNDLE moved to Moonta, and he is not listed in the Annual Almanacs 1866-72. I found that he lived in Blanche Street, Moonta when he died, but I do not have a street number, nor can I find any reference in the Land Titles system. He died in Moonta in December 1871, of inflammation of the lungs, likely a typical miner's disease.

William RUNDLE b1852

William and Caroline RUNDLE's eldest son, also William, was born in Cornwall in December 1852. He came to South A ustralia with his parents, aged just 2 years, and married Ann MORRIS in 1876 in Moonta. Ann's father William Laity M ORRIS (and another Cornwall resident), is also one of my almost 20 ancestors who came to South Australia in the 180 0's, and is being written up in this series. William RUNDLE was a wheelwright according to his marriage certificate, and so was his new father-in-law. It would be easy to deduce that William RUNDLE was apprenticed to William Laity MORRIS, and the said Ann would have had plenty of time to get to know her future husband. The

couple had eight children, with four dying at an early age. Three were born in Moonta, and the rest at Port Adelaide. I found an entry in the Sands and MacDougall Directory 1900, showing their address as living in College Crescent, Portland Estate, in Port Adelaide. The seventh child was Edwin Morris RUNDLE, my grandfather, born in December 1887 in Port Adelaide.

Edwin Morris RUNDLE b1887

Edwin RUNDLE was born in Port Adelaide in 1887, and he married Maude Holbrook RANN in December 1914, at Port Adelaide. Edwin was listed as sawyer/woodcutter, and Maude as an accountant, a very unusual occupation for a woman at this time. Again, one could speculate they met at the Globe Timber Works, where my mother Connie got her first job as a shorthand typist. On Edwin's death certificate, he is described as a retired caretaker, so was this at the Globe Timber Mills also? Edwin and Maude retired to live in Cheltenham, and Maude died in 1946, eight and a half months before I was born. Family stories indicate that Connie was very close to her mother and was distraught at her death. Edwin and Maude's children, Lance (born 1916, died 1973), Constance (born 1920, died 1974), and Neil (born 1928, died 1994), all died at relatively young ages, but lived fruitful lives. Unlike my fathers line, Edwin and Maude's cousins are quite numerous. I am in contact with Neil's children, but not with those of Lance.

Edwin has appeared in several newspaper articles as being an accomplished baritone and bass, and he has sung in several concerts, and at weddings for extended family members. Edwin was also recorded as an entrant in a Champion gentlemen's solo competition, as reported in 'The Register', Thursday 20 April 1922. He was a member of The Port Adelaide Orpheus Society.

The newspaper notice (right) describes one such concert at the Semaphore Methodist Church. From The Advertiser 16 December 1919.

CHURCH INTELLIGENCE.

On Sunday afternoon, before a large audience, a performance of choruses and soles from "The Messiah" was given by the combined choirs of the Semaphore Methodist and Congregational Churches in the Methodist Church, Semaphore, under the conductorship of Mr. C. W. Remphrey, who had a chorus of over 50 voices under his baton. The sole parts were excellently rendered by Miss Ada Wordie, A.M.U.A., Miss Hetty Young, Messers, R. J. L. Worthley, and Ed vin Rundle. Miss Hilda Jeffress presided at the piano and Mr. W. R. McKinlay at the organ.

Edwin and Maude moved from Port Adelaide to Fourth Avenue, Cheltenham, probably after retirement, and lived there until Maud died in 1946. Edwin remarried in 1950, to Rita BAWDEN, and moved to Fulham Gardens, where I remember visiting many times. Edwin died at his home in 1958, and Rita died in a Victor Harbour nursing home in the nineteen seventies.

Constance Maude RUNDLE b1920

Constance was known as Connie for most of her life and married Ken SQUIRE in 1944. Ken SQUIRE is included in the SQUIRE narrative, already published. I can recall being told that Connie's mum Maude met Ethel GILL at Ethel's wedding to John SQUIRE in 1914. This is also recorded on the marriage certificate because Maude signed the Certificte as a witness. They clearly kept in touch, and these influential women almost certainly orchestrated the matching of Connie with Ken SQUIRE in the early 1940s. Ken and Connie's three children were born in 1946 (Graham later to be known as Jan), 1949 (Jeffrey) and 1954 (Valerie).

Ken and Connie lived with Ken's father in Torrensville when they first married, but moved to Glenside soon after Ken's father died. They subsequently moved several times in the eastern suburbs as they tried to find a better climate to help with Connie's severe asthma illness. Connie kept regular contact with 'the Globe girls', a group of former Globe Timber Mills' office staff, and devoted her time to her family and to various activities in the Congregational church as they moved around. At Rose Park, she edited the local Congregational Church newsletter for a time.
